This week in Year 3, the children have been learning how to count money in pence and pounds. Both classes enjoyed doing practical sessions in Maths. They know the value of the coins and were able to come up with different combinations when adding up the coins. In English, we continued to learn about the emperors and the Roman Army. The children have worked really hard in their topic work this week and were able to remember information about some of the emperors.

Year 4 are continuing their studies about Ancient Sumer. After a fantastic lesson acting out daily life events from this historic period, we are looking forward to writing historical fiction stories based on an event in an Ancient Sumerian city. What will happen when an enemy army invades? Who is going to make the ground breaking invention of the wheel? How will the citizens be saved from the flood? In Maths the children have made great progress in their understanding of coordinates on a grid and their homework this week will reveal a summertime treat. Have you worked out what it is yet? | UKS2 News (Years 5 and 6) | Foundation Stage |

| Myth writing has been a major focus in Year 5 over the last two weeks. Fantastic beasts have been imaginatively created including Crocataurs (half man half crocodile), Giants which do their masters bidding and many more wonderful concoctions. Importantly, each myth contains a moral or important message with good often triumphing over evil after taking on difficult quests. The children have ensured their writing is engaging by also including imposing locations for their antagonists to live; whilst many tales favour the customary castles some have used otherworldly settings such as cloud palaces. We are very proud of our wonderful writing! Year 6 have been learning about the causes of World War 1 as part of their Britain at war topic. They have written a balanced argument discussing why war happens and are now planning and writing an explanation text on the cause of World War 1. In science we have been learning about the digestive system and the children have been finding out more about what their body needs in order to function correctly. This week in PHSE, Year 6 have been looking at the words 'Power and Conflict' and how to recognise when someone is gaining power and control. As well as this they have been looking at how they might stand up for themselves or friends if they are in a situation where someone is trying to gain power or control over them. Next week is SATs week. Year 6 have been working incredibly hard to prepare for the tests they will be taking. In order support them further, they should ensure they have a good night's sleep, a decent breakfast (if they are not coming in to school for breakfast) and arrive at school on time so that they are not rushing in the morning. Mrs McLean | The children in Nursery are enjoying their topic this half term called 'Sunshine & Sunflowers.' They are reading the book called ' Don't put your finger in the Jelly Nelly' by Nick Sharratt and ABC Zoo.' In Literacy, they are enjoying looking at rhyming words and have been practising writing their name . In Phonics, they are enjoying rhyming different foods. In Maths, the children are practising their counting and naming lots of different shapes. Outside in the playground, the children have been hunting for bugs. The children in Reception have been learning about their new topic which is called ' Animal Safari. ' The children have loved reading the story called 'The Koala Who Could' written by Rachel Bright. After sharing the story, the children have been thinking about their worries and trying to think about how to overcome the different challenges they have faced. They have then been setting themselves challenges. In Literacy, the children have been writing sentences about animals they may find if there were going on a safari. In Phonics this week, the children are still working on their Phase 4 where they are reading and writing longer words. They are learning lots of compound words. They are learning tricky words 'there' 'when' 'what' and 'one'. In Maths this week, the children are creating their own Maths stories using the safari animals around adding and subtracting problems. Outside, the children have been choosing a safari animal and pretending to move like one. Caterpillar Updates: Two of our caterpillars have hatched out of their cocoons and are now beautiful butterflies. We have enjoyed watching the butterflies on the class webcam. They are now waiting for their friends so we can release them. |

Changes to Penalty Notices for Non School Attendance

The Department for Education (DfE) will introduce a new National Framework for Penalty Notices on 19 August 2024, this is explained in more detail in Working Together to Improve School Attendance 2024.

Who is Liable for a Penalty Notice/Prosecution

Penalty notices/prosecution are now issued/sought for each parent for each child (per parent, per child). Parent refers to anyone with parental responsibility and may include carers, step parents, grandparents or any other adult with parental responsibility.

For Example: If a family with three children take term time leave of absence, each parent would receive three penalty notices of £160 for each child. This would amount to £960 if paid within 28 days, reduced to £480 if paid within 21 days.

First Offence

The first time a penalty notice is issued for term time leave of absence or unauthorised absences the amount has increased to:

£160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days of being issued, this amount is reduced to £80 if paid within the first 21 days of being issued

Second Offence

If a second penalty notice is issued for term time leave of absence or unauthorised absence within a three year period, there **will not** be a discount for early payment.

The penalty notice is payable at the full amount of £160 within 28 days of the date of being issued

Third Offence/Any Further Offenses Within a Three Year Period

If there is a third instance of term time leave of absence or unauthorised absence, a penalty notice will not be issued.

Any further cases will be referred directly to Magistrates' Court for prosecution. Magistrates can impose a fine of up to £2500 per parent, per child.

If a parent is found guilty of an offence, this is recorded as a criminal offence and will show on any DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) checks as "Failure to Safeguard a Child's Education"

Reasons for Penalty Notices/Prosecution Term Time Leave of Absence

A school can apply to their local authority for a penalty notice if there are 5 or more days of consecutive absence due to term time leave.

Unauthorised Absence

A school may apply to their local authority for a penalty notice if there are 10 or more sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period. These absences can be a combination of the following codes:

G - Term Time Leave of Absence

O - Unauthorised Absence - Failure to contact the school (unexplained absence) may result in an absence being recorded as unauthorised

U - Late After the Close of Registers

Transition, In year Admissions and Cross Border Checks

All schools will have the ability to check for previous penalty notices/prosecutions issued within a three year period in their own local authority or any other local authority that the family has lived in at year 6 to 7 and 11 to 12 transition or for in year admissions.



STREETSAFE

The StreetSafe website www.police.uk/streetsafe allows anyone to record areas where they don't feel safe. This will help police and partner agencies make the streets safer for everyone, particularly women and girls.

You may have felt unsafe due to environmental factors like lack of street lighting, abandoned buildings, vandalism or perhaps you've been followed or verbally abused.

Your information could help police and partner agencies to pinpoint problem areas and make changes which could include installing CCTV, street-lighting or introducing night-time patrols.
